

NATIVE TRIBES OF NORTH AMERICA, CENTRAL AMERICA AND THE CARIBBEAN

Historically, for uncountable times, native tribes in the Americas have been on the move. Few remain in what they would consider the specific land of their ancestral origin. Moves were by choice or forced. Where many tribes are now, those who survived the holocaust since 1492, or where they were even hundreds of years ago, may be a far distance from the ancient origins of the people.

This map gives a Native American perspective by placing the tribes when they were in full flower ~ the "Glory Days". It is pre-contact from across the eastern sea or, at least, before that contact seriously effected change. Stretching over a 400 year spance the time of contact was quite different from tribe to tribe. For instance, the "Glory Days" of the Maya and Aztec came to an end very long before the interior tribes of other areas, with some still resisting almost until the 20th Century.

At one time numbering in the millions, the native peoples in the Americas spoke close to 4,000 languages. This map could not possibly list every tribe and sub-group or band. My apology to descendants of any such groups not listed and to any descendants of tribal leaders not pictured. I could only rely on photos available to me, earlier artist portrayals before photography, and my own imagination.
